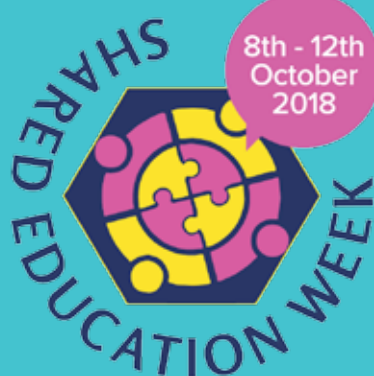

I am pleased to introduce the first edition of the Education Authority's Sharing Works Newsletter.

These divisions are reflected in our schools where the majority of children continue to be educated solely with children of a similar background.

Shared Education seeks to help tackle division by providing opportunities for direct, sustained, curriculum based contact between pupils and teachers from all backgrounds through collaboration between schools from different sectors. It also helps raise educational standards and to build a culture of good relations.

The Department of Education's Sharing Works policy commits to developing sustainable long-term arrangements to support the delivery of Shared Education.

Funding programmes, including the Delivering Social Change Shared Education Signature Project and the Peace IV Shared Education Programme, have enabled great progress to be made in both promoting and embedding Shared Education.

We are continuing to fund schools to develop and embed shared education collaborative practices in partnership with others on a cross-community and socio-economic basis.

Lessons learned, including the identification of best practice, emerging from these and previous funding programmes will be used to inform how best to support the delivery of Shared Education when these funding opportunities end. This will help build long term capacity in the education system to deliver high quality Shared Education.

It is right that we celebrate and share the good work that is taking place in Shared Education partnerships across Northern Ireland, and that we raise awareness of the benefits of and developments in Shared Education. This Newsletter is an important part of celebrating the success of Shared Education.

Shared Education Signature Project

Overview

Across Northern Ireland thousands of children attend our Nursery, Primary, Post Primary and Special Schools. Within these settings each pupil is exposed to a range of experiences and learning opportunities that aim to support every aspect of their development, both as a learner and as a future member of society.

Northern Ireland is recognised across the world as a country of division but one which is slowly emerging from a sustained period of conflict. Substantial challenges still exist with this process, not least the fact that our school system is represented by a number of different sectors, a situation which results in pupils from similar backgrounds attending schools of the same type and not building friendships with those from other backgrounds.

As far back as the 1980s, cross community initiatives were introduced in schools in an attempt to break-down the barriers between communities. Some of these were successful in facilitating pupil interaction but the scope to develop sustainable relationships and prioritise learning was limited.

In more recent times, through the development of the revised curriculum, the Department of Education has sought to complement face-to-face pupil engagement with the introduction of the curricular themes of Personal Development & Mutual Understanding and Learning for Life and Work. The further introduction of the Community Relations and Diversity (CRED) policy and the Entitlement Framework, helped create a framework within which links between schools of different types became increasingly important.

From 2007 onwards a number of pilot projects focused on establishing collaborative partnerships between different types of schools were established. This approach, now termed 'Shared Education', demonstrated that collaboration had a significant value-added impact in regard to relationship building and educational practice.

In 2015, the Department of Education, working with the Executive Office and Atlantic Philanthropies introduced the Shared Education Signature Project. Supported by a team of officers based within the Education Authority, the project's aim is to build on previous pilots and upscale the level of collaboration as well as increasing the numbers of schools involved in partnership working.

Over 370 schools in Northern Ireland are now active participants in Shared Education Signature Partnerships. These Partnerships are made up of two or more schools of different management types. Each Partnership is unique and provides opportunities

for pupils to engage in new and enhanced learning experiences that take place in their own classroom or at their Partnership school.

Partnerships have the freedom to work across the curriculum including the core areas of literacy and numeracy. The programmes are devised by teachers from the member schools who undertake joint research and planning as well as developing the necessary resources to deliver an enjoyable series of lessons. Opportunities for team building, developing communication, problem solving and thinking skills are all key ingredients of a shared education programme. There are benefits to be gained for whole school communities through children learning together and teachers planning together.

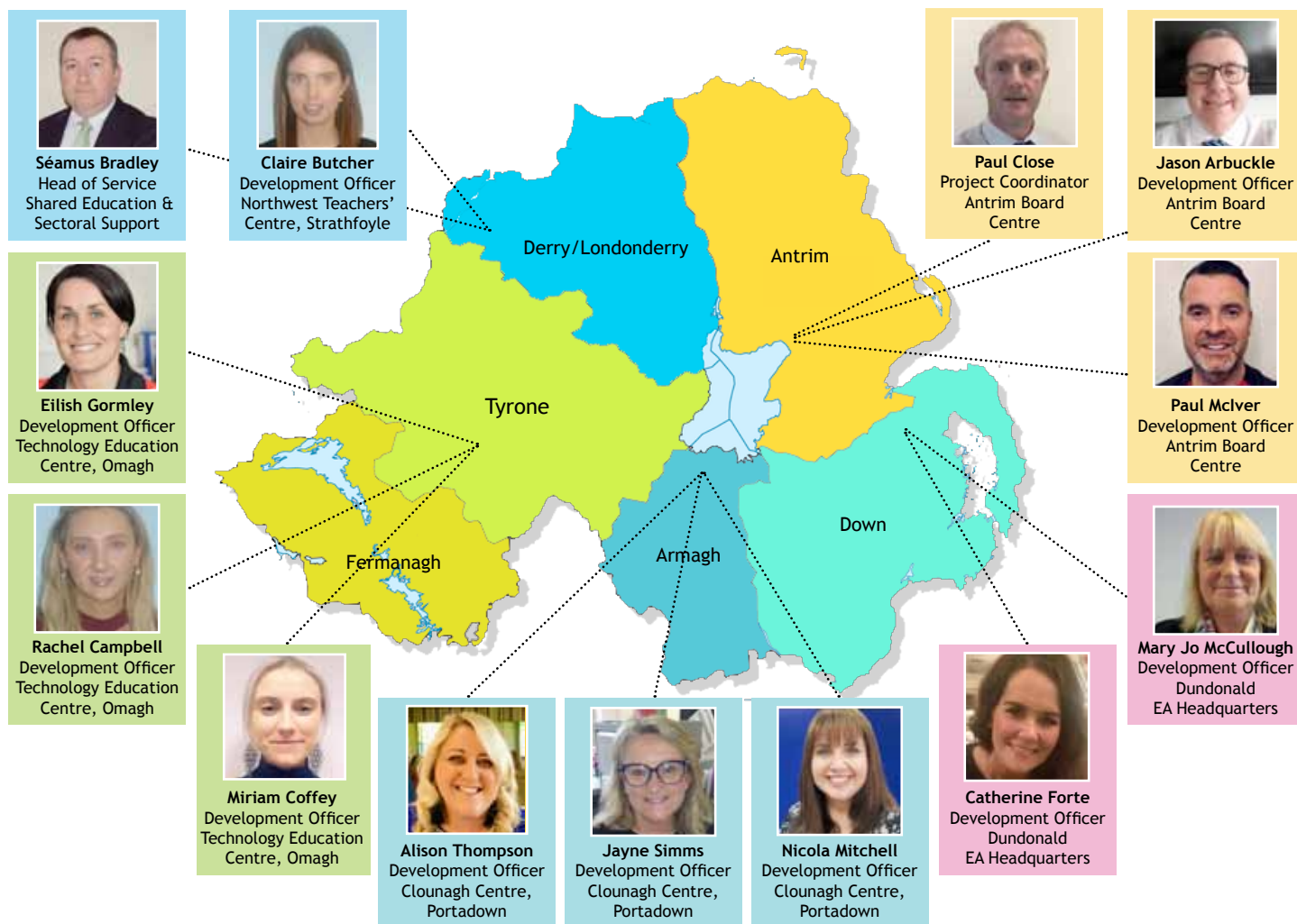
TEACHER PROFESSIONAL LEARNING STRATEGY

In addition to Shared Pupil Activity, the Shared Education Signature Project also supports the delivery of Teacher Professional Learning by providing teachers with the opportunity to collaborate with colleagues from within their own partnership and beyond. Schools have identified mutual areas for development and together have worked on strategies to bring about improvement. School Leaders and Teachers have engaged in peer observation and assessment and have also had the opportunity to discuss pedagogy and practice. Feedback from teachers strongly suggests that this joint professional development has helped enthuse teachers and raise standards, not only across the Partnership but also within individual classrooms.

MOVING FORWARD

The introduction of the Sharing Works Policy by the Department of Education in 2015, combined with the Shared Education Act in 2016 has confirmed the Assembly's endorsement of cross sectoral collaboration as a mechanism to increase educational outcomes, bring about school improvement and enhance community relations. The Education Authority now has a clear duty to promote, encourage and facilitate shared education and this will place collaboration firmly at the heart of educational development over the next number of years. Whilst this will present its own challenges, there is a substantial prize to be won, namely the opportunity to secure a better educational experience for all our young people and a society more at ease with its own diversity and difference.

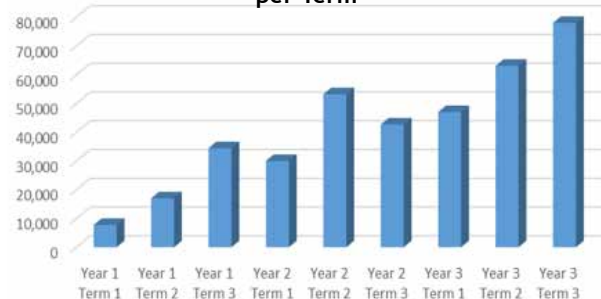

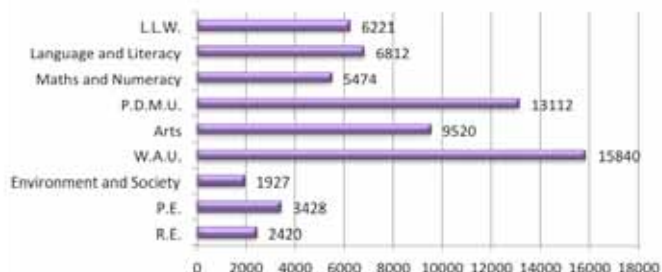
Percentage of SESP Schools by ELB District



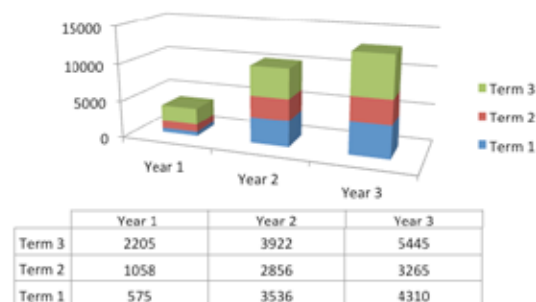
Total Number of Pupils Engaged in Shared Activity
per Term



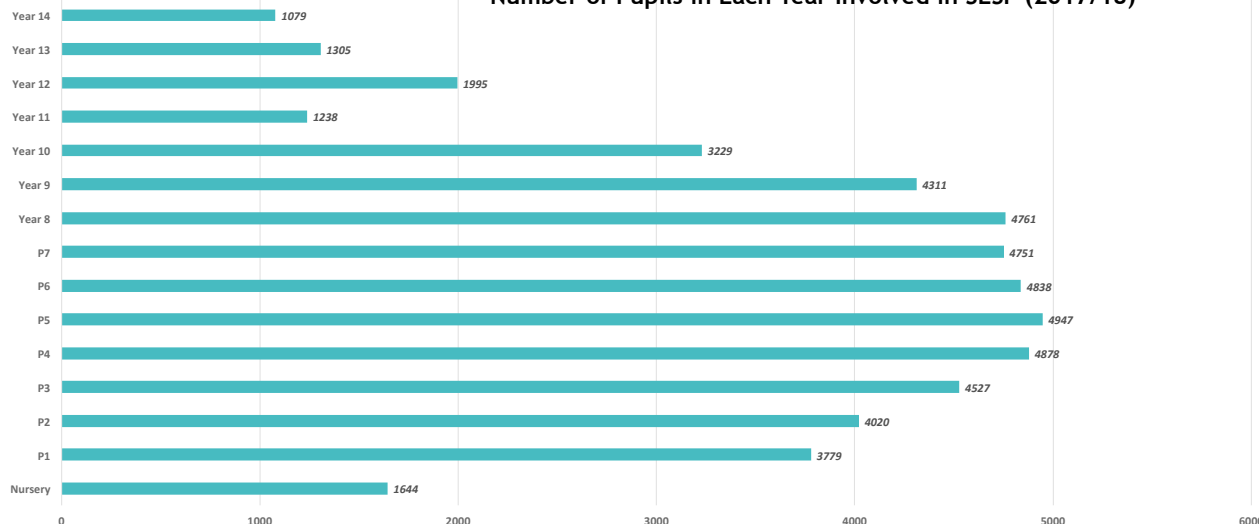
Number of Pupils Involved in Most Popular

Down High School and St Patrick's Grammar School have just completed the first year of our shared education journey and it has been an empowering and enriching experience. Pupils have collaborated with charities and civic society, shared in Mindfulness workshops, received targeted and shared intervention in Literacy and Numeracy, ventured as one on field trips and in STEM challenges, coalesced in Young Enterprise, answered questions as part of a joint team in a French competition, received shared fitness training for Gaelic football and rugby, and been in the audience for both Nolan's Top Table and a conference to mark the 20th Anniversary of the Good Friday Agreement. A majority of our teaching departments have met together to plan events and to share good practice. Teachers from both schools will be participating in a shared middle leader professional development session, and an entire year group will be learning together in shared classrooms.

Shared Education in Northern Ireland Making International Connections



The first pilot projects on the Shared Education model of school collaboration began in 2007 when twelve schools began, with a team in Queen's University, to create cross-sectoral partnerships and explore how they could work together effectively. Later work by the Queen's team, the Fermanagh Trust and the North Eastern Education and Library Board broadened and deepened our understanding of effective collaboration. Those small beginnings have now grown into the Shared Education Signature Programme and the Peace IV programme which involve over half the schools in Northern Ireland.

A huge body of research evidence has been amassed over that period, ranging from explorations of best practice in coordinating school timetables; to in-depth studies of the experience of teachers working in partnership; to surveys and focus groups with students and teachers; to the largest longitudinal study of the effects of contact between students from different communities.

An unexpected development from all this work has been an extensive and growing level of international interest in the Shared Education model, with a number of divided societies adapting the approach to their distinctive circumstances. Academics from Queen's have been working with colleagues in Israel to support collaborative networks of Arab and Jewish schools, including support for a major training programme for school principals in Jerusalem. USAID has supported a Shared Education programme between Macedonian and Albanian students in Macedonia, and work is underway to explore the options for Shared Education work in Croatia and Bosnia-Herzegovina. In a somewhat different context, there

have been teacher exchanges between Northern Ireland and Los Angeles, funded by the US Embassy in London, to explore different approaches to collaboration in each place, and more are planned.

Current research priorities include further work on the conditions which make contact most likely to promote positive intergroup relationships; how collaboration can be best used to build professional learning communities and promote school improvement; the extent to which the interweave of connections between teachers can help us understand collaborative learning; and the role of collaboration in promoting effective professional development for teachers. On top of all this, there is a growing body of comparative research which is looking at the similarities and differences between Shared Education in different countries.

In little over a decade Shared Education has evolved from an attempt to find a way in which schools could help secure the peace, and contribute to the development of a shared and better society in Northern Ireland, to a situation where it has achieved real systemic change. Support from the Development Officer team in the Education Authority is now enabling more and more schools to make their contribution to this new direction for all our schools. In this task they are aided by the body of knowledge we have already developed on effective practice, and they are helping to grow that body of knowledge still further, so that schools can play an even more effective role in preparing our young people to build a better society for everyone.

We are delighted to report that the 2017-2018 academic year has been one which has seen SELF continue to build its membership and, more importantly, continue to advocate on behalf of our members with the Department of Education, the Education Authority and other key education stakeholders. It has been a year of change and development in the Shared Education story and SELF has been working to build our Mainstreaming Strategy as well as the capacity to effectively influence the changes ahead.

Our efforts have played an active role on two main fronts, seeking to ensure that the practitioner voice is heard in relation to the mainstreaming arrangements for Shared Education as well as in the Area Planning process. We have had two active Working Groups during this year and are currently working on two position papers which will be shared with members in the new term;

- Mainstreaming Shared Education
- Shared Education and Area Planning

The SELF Conference 'Shaping the Future', held in May 2018 was a tremendous success with 238 attendees representing 106 Primary Schools, 69 Post Primary, 10 Special Schools, 34 from Educational Stakeholder organisations and 17 from the Community Sector. The keynote speaker Tom Sherrington inspired those present with his address on Teachers' Professional Learning. The conference was primarily a Listening Event which gave the participants an opportunity to address some of the key questions and issues arising related to mainstreaming. The analysis of the feedback received has formed the basis of SELF paper to be published in the new term.

Special thanks to the Education Authority staff and SESP coordinators present who acted as group facilitators and scribes on the day.

Continuing to build links with educational stakeholders was a priority and SELF has now established good links with C2K and CCEA as well as key community and peace building organisations, notably The Community Relations Council (CRC) and Community Relations in Schools (CRIS) who we believe can support schools in establishing and embedding strong, effective Shared Education provision which will continue to thrive into the future.

In the new term, SELF will be actively seeking members to participate in Consultation groups with these organisations in the future to ensure that the practitioner voice is central to developments in support of Shared Education.

The big news for the year ahead is that Shared Education Week will take place in the week commencing 8th October 2018. We look forward to an exciting week when the work of all of our school partnerships as well as those who support them can be celebrated and shared with our local communities as well as the wider public.

St Mary's High School Downpatrick and Nendrum College Comber



Two days in December almost sounds like a movie title and given the amount of activity the pupils from St Mary's High School Downpatrick and Nendrum College Comber packed into their two days of SHED events it would have to have been a historical adventure crossed with a political thriller! Pupils on both days spent the morning in either the Somme Heritage Centre or Stormont where life was brought to equally dormant places by excellent guides, garrulous MP's and inquisitive pupils. The afternoons saw pupils jumbled up on their buses with one bus heading to the Shankill and the other to the Falls where they explored and examined the representation of conflict through murals. This fitted with our two-year overall programme which combined two different pedagogical approaches and drew together a range of different subjects. Using a Connected Learning approach the subjects of History, LLW English, Drama and RE had focussed in Year 9 on topics related to the Civil Rights Movement in the USA, the story of Emmett Till, and the role of Martin Luther King and Human Trafficking and then in Year 10, following the Facing History methodology, each subject moved closer to home exploring WW1, sectarianism, local government and politics and how conflict impacts in big ways in small places. The day ended with the two buses meeting at the "peace line" where students disembarked and signed the international peace wall.





Ballynahinch Shared Education Partnership

The Ballynahinch Shared Education Partnership hosted Principals from Jerusalem in Ballynahinch. The Jerusalem delegation wanted to see Shared Education in practice in a NI context.

The High School, Ballynahinch and Assumption Grammar School co-hosted the visiting Principals and representatives from the Jerusalem Education Authority. The schools were asked by Professor Tony Gallagher and Dr Gavin Duffy from The School of Social Sciences and Social Work at Queen's University to host this visit to showcase Shared Education in practice as a means of breaking down barriers in a divided society. The group visited The High School, Ballynahinch to speak to Principals and the Shared Education Coordinators in the schools. They then visited Assumption Grammar School to listen to a performance by the Partnership's Shared Education Choir and meet the teachers and students involved. In both schools the visitors were able to take a tour and visit classes to talk to pupils and teachers.

The Shared Education Choir is made up of children from the four Partnership Schools: Assumption Grammar School, The High School, Ballynahinch, St Colman's High School and St Colmcille's High School. It has been strengthened further by the involvement of students from Knockevin Special School. The Shared Education Choir performed a rendition of Ash's 'Shining Light' last Sunday at the Waterfront Hall, in which they added an accompaniment of Makaton sign language, taught to all students in the choir. Ash's frontman, Tim Wheeler, reached out via Twitter to say, 'Wow, that really gave me goosebumps, beautiful!'

Our initiative aims to advance the goals of improving educational attainment and developing stronger and mutually beneficial cross-community relationships using a shared education model that will involve pupils, parents, teachers, school leaders and outside organisations within the wider community across a number of working class communities in North Belfast.

This year the Year Two to Year Seven children have been involved, working in each other's schools. They have enjoyed activities such as improving maths skills through play dates using Numicon, using ICT to investigate each other's schools, celebrating their 'Identity' through art workshops with New Lodge Arts, producing joint stories through writing workshops with 'Fighting with Words' and fishing in Dromore to help support mental well-being. The parents have also enjoyed meeting up and doing some flower arranging together! The children really look forward to their 'Celebration Day' at the end of the year to reflect and celebrate everything that they have achieved together.



The Wonder of Shared Education

Edmund Rice College, Glengormley and Hazelwood Integrated College, Newtownabbey

Following the success of Shared English lessons last year, we were keen to develop a programme of study that fed into more aims of Shared Education than just raising academic achievement - we wanted to nurture our pupils holistically as well. After some research, we decided to purchase two sets of the novel *Wonder* by P.J. Palacio, one for each school. This would allow the study of plot, language and character, but also give us scope to consider the novel's primary theme of inclusion and diversity.

We identified two Year 8 classes to study the book during lessons in their respective schools, using a shared scheme of work. The two classes met in October, on a Belfast Bus Tour, after which they enjoyed a series of shared lessons, located in both schools. Lessons included writing a Movie Review, the winners of which received a Movie House voucher, and a lesson built around the theme of 'Inclusion and Diversity' where the novel provided a stimulus for discussion and exploration of the theme.

As luck would have it, the film version of *Wonder* was released in December 2017, allowing us a Shared cinema visit which was thoroughly enjoyed by pupils and teachers alike!

They learn about the importance of mutual respect, building tolerance and acceptance of difference.

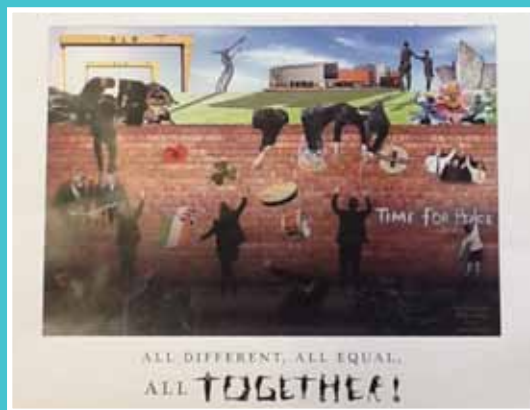
This supports the young people to be able to engage constructively in society and helps them to understand we have much in common with those from other communities.

The spirit of participation throughout the process of the project was transformative, rather than simply the performance night. The practicalities of working with the two casts half an hour away from each other has been logistically challenging for the teachers but the rewards have been huge."

"I got to play the part of Claudius, an evil step-father and the new King of Denmark. We met with St. Patrick's about once a week, sometimes they came to our school and sometimes we went to theirs. I loved meeting with Crossmaglen and best of all we got to perform the play in Armagh Theatre. The language was hard and challenging but I loved it."

The final performance was enjoyed and supported by a full capacity of parents and community members from Markethill and Crossmaglen and was hailed a resounding success and a feather in the cap for all involved.

St Joseph's PS Tyrella & Newcastle PS Term Two Shared Education Programme

P4 & P5 have worked together through two shared lessons each this term. Through working in pairs, they have extended their ICT skills and collaborated through the areas of WAU and Literacy. There was focus on 'Differences' including work on communities and identities. Pupils have had the opportunity to explore and use 'Book Creator' on the iPads as a means of digital development through Exchange and Express. The pupils had the opportunity to take part in online discussion through a Shared Education page on school websites.

The children also completed questionnaires to evaluate their levels of enjoyment and learning. Many of the children reported that they preferred using Book Creator on the iPads as they could combine their skills in Chatterpix & Photospeak to produce a digital story. The vast majority of P4 pupils preferred the art activity.

P6/7 classes participated in 5 lessons. They had opportunities to take part in teambuilding in order to forge closer friendships. The focus was on cultural differences associated with community symbols. They learnt about the significance of the poppy and shamrock. They engaged in a culture of mutual understanding and inter-relationships through digital literacy using Book Creator. They completed questionnaires which indicated that the majority of pupils had made friends and felt they could work together in mixed groups.

Teachers have established close, positive links through planning, teaching and monitoring & evaluation days. They have created schemes of work for the term based on topics related to cultural diversity, an evaluation

report of work done and produced written, video and photographic evidence. The pupils have produced quality pieces of work related to Book Creator. Teachers have led very successful shared lessons in both schools. Through establishing positive friendships, the pupils have shown respect and understanding of each other.

Through BoGs meetings with the Principal, all Governors have been fully informed of the work undertaken in P4-7 this term. Through staff training days led by the Nerve Centre and ICT coordinators in both schools, all staff agreed on a programme of work for Term 2 regarding Shared Education. Both Principals have successfully established an agreed system for the sharing of resources, accommodation and financial spend for Term 2. Principals monitor the programme through coordinator self-evaluation.

Principals engaged with ETI in a monitoring/evaluation of progress made to date. It was agreed that the collaboration was at Expanding/Embedding stage with Community Links identified as Developing/Expanding. Evidence of CPD was highlighted as a strength of this years work as there was clear impact on pupil learning as a result.

Through regular updates on both websites, parents and the whole school community have been kept well informed of the work done this term.

The British Legion supported the P6/7 project through a shared visit where the children learnt about the significance of the poppy to both communities.

Building the Peace: The Good Friday Agreement 20 Years On

The 10th of April 2018 marked 20 years since the Good Friday Agreement was signed. Five Down High School pupils and five pupils from St Patrick's Grammar School were fortunate to be able to partake in a commemoration of this historic event at QUB. Appropriately this was a Shared Education experience. This challenging and reflective conference gathered together many of the iconic figures involved in the Northern Ireland peace process and not least President Clinton's Special Envoy, George J Mitchell, the primary architect of both the Mitchell Principles of Non-Violence and the Good Friday Agreement.

Key figures from our recent past were organised into panels to discuss various legacy issues related to the Good Friday Agreement. These included the degree of community participation in the peace process and the ramifications of the Belfast Accord in the light of the current political impasse at Stormont. Former political leaders such as Seamus Mallon, David Trimble, Gerry Adams and Peter Robinson all took part.

The final panel explored international input into the Belfast Agreement and the lessons of our peace process for the wider world. This panel was chaired by Senator George J. Mitchell and made up of significant former leaders - President Bill Clinton, Prime Minister Tony Blair and Taoiseach Bertie Ahern. Bill Clinton sounded a prophetic warning, reminding us that democracy is a precious gift that is imperilled across much of today's world, and we must nurture this gift. The event reflected on the profound changes that have occurred over the last two decades and challenged our current leaders to overcome the challenges posed by the remaining legacy issues. We were grateful to have this opportunity and it was a thoroughly inspiring and insightful afternoon.

National Trust Minecraft Project



Using the popular game Minecraft on the iPad, children were able to take an innovative and creative look at their visit to the Corn Mill at Castle Ward increasing their knowledge of historical sites and old buildings in the locality, the features of the buildings and ways of life and cultures that have been shaped by influences from the local and wider world.

Pupils in shared classes were able to:

- Learn about the history of the Corn Mill.
- Build the Corn Mill using the given dimensions with the materials within a collaborative Minecraft World.
- Document the history the site and the project in a Digital Book.
- Share their work to the wider community through the Seesaw app and the iTeach website.



The Curriculum Focused Learning Outcomes included:

LITERACY - Sharing, responding and evaluating ideas, arguments and points of view in discussions throughout the project; Participate in modelled, shared, guided and independent writing when composing content for the Digital Book.

NUMERACY - Processes - Select the materials and mathematics appropriate for a task; Appreciate important ideas about measurement including the need for accuracy; Understand and use scale in the context of simple maps and drawings. Use programmable apps to explore movement and direction and create pictures, patterns and shapes.

WAU - Technological change and the impact of inventors and inventions over time. Buildings and their features now and in the past; Historical sites and buildings in the locality; Designing and building models.

PDMU - Knowing about aspects of their cultural heritage, including the diversity of cultures that contribute to the locality.

Minecraft has been used as an amazing tool in education providing pupils with the opportunity to develop skills such as collaboration, teamwork, creativity and problem solving.

St Dominic's Belfast & Friends' School Lisburn

Politics in Action concluded with a presentation of the pupils' report in Stormont on 26 April. The Citizenship departments had organised a learning fair at Stormont and in St Dominic's focusing on political parties in Northern Ireland and the main issues facing NI today.

St Dominic's and Friends have been very lucky to avail of the services of Peter Weil. Peter's background is broadcast journalism and includes producing 'Panorama', 'Newsnight' and 'World In Action' as well as editing Channel Four's 'The People's Parliament' and ITV's 'London Tonight'. Although not a trained teacher, he has been Head of Youth Programmes in BBC Northern Ireland; his most recent job was as CEO of the independent production company, CTVC. Last year CTVC's online education channel, TrueTube, won Channel of the Year at the Children's BAFTAs in November, the first time the category went to an online-only channel. The other finalists were CBBC, Cbeebies and the Cartoon Network.

'Politics In Action' is an extra-curricular Shared Education initiative for ten year 11 students from St. Dominic's School and ten year 11 students from Friends' School. Since September they have been studying some of the issues behind gender equality.

The emphasis of the course is on the practical side of politics rather than the theoretical. It was designed to develop a realisation of the importance of listening, as much as contributing, to the debate, of demonstrating respect to those who hold opposing views and a mastery of the key skills involved in establishing win - win solutions.

This has involved establishing a number of Shared student groups who set up Inquiries into various equality issues.

They have talked to people who are affected by the current legislation, interviewed representatives from seven political parties in Northern Ireland and met journalists and front bench spokespersons from the two main parties in Dublin. They have drafted a set of proposals and

whilst working closely the Northern Ireland Assembly's Education Service at Stormont's Parliament Buildings in Belfast, they presented their proposals to parents, staff, governors, media and politicians from all the main parties in N Ireland.

They collaborated so often and have clearly become good friends too. Their commitment included:

- Six alternating shared sessions in each school (fortnightly)
- September Stormont Visit 1: Tour and Icebreakers.
- November Stormont Visit 2: Questioning Local Politicians.

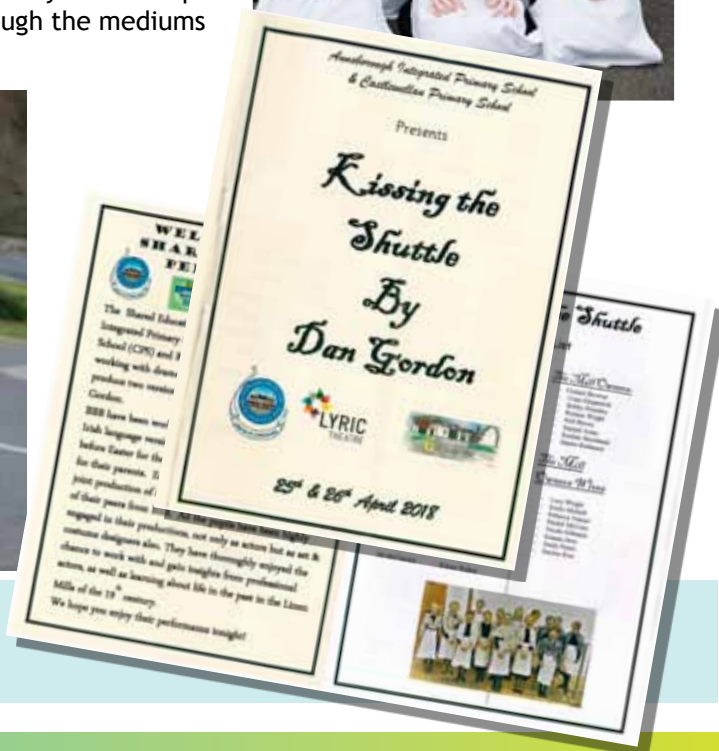
A Personal Message from George Mitchell was read out congratulating the pupils on their work in relation to Rights and Reconciliation

'Building a Strong and Shared Community'

A case study of Shared Education in De La Salle High School, Blackwater Integrated College and St Mary's High School Downpatrick

Context:

As our partnership develops, we continue to strive towards achieving positive relationships among staff and students, reaching out to others in our local community. By working together, we hope to improve educational outcomes for each student involved in Shared Education, and to open up opportunities for more pupils to become involved in Shared Education.

Our strategic vision, of creating positive relationships, begins with our staff as we co-teach and collaborate, modelling behaviour for our students. We connect staff and students from various subject areas of school life: ICT, Science, Maths, Physical Education, and others. With collaboration at KS4 level with exam classes, it was our target to make this transition more comfortable for our students and so we have introduced Shared Education to all KS3 year groups. With more time, we aim to increase collaborative contact even more.

We are now in our third Action Plan for Shared Education, beginning with only two subject areas and growing year by year. As well as increasing collaborative contact between students, we also aim to involve more departments in collaborative teaching and learning. Collaboration between the three schools existed before

the introduction of these three Action Plans, with SLT collaborating to create more opportunities for our students at KS4 level, introducing Occupational Studies. Shared Education has helped to nurture the relationship already established between the three schools.

The three schools are diverse in background, considering only one is co-educational, and one is integrated. Our schools are similar in that we hold a similar demographic in number and socio-economic backgrounds of pupils. Some of our students have siblings and family members in our partnership schools, and so there is a parental/guardian link as well.

All three schools are in agreement that Shared Education must benefit the learning of our students, and so specific aims and objectives are outlined on each of our school development plans.

SLT and BoG:

Throughout the three years, our Senior Leadership Teams and Board of Governors have all been involved in the progression of collaborative learning and teaching. SLT and Board of Governors are regularly updated by coordinators, and are consulted on planned areas of development in the area of Shared Education.

Staff Development:

Staff have been given opportunities for their own professional development through the TPL strategy courses provided and other course providers. Many staff have availed of these opportunities, and many hope to do so post-Christmas. These courses have been identified by Principals as key areas in which our staff can develop their skills and from which our partnership can benefit. It is also good practice that staff members present key findings of their training to remaining staff during school development days. These practices can then be disseminated among the partnership schools. Such courses have included: Collaborative Leadership, Understanding and Managing Behaviour, Collaborative Learning Online for Shared Education and Reconciliation, and Creating Effective Partnerships within the Local Community.

Sharing of Good Practice:

Our students and staff had a very positive experience in sharing good practice to parents, fellow students, staff, BoG representatives and the local media during our presentation day in June 2017. Students presented their work and feedback during a presentation, as well as discussed and showcased work during a walking gallery. This was an invaluable experience to our students, who took the lead in sharing their feedback on progression. Coordinators have and continue to share good practice during School Development days to fellow staff members. This is an opportunity to showcase the work



of students and staff, and also to promote the work of Shared Education to all of the school community.

Progression:

With such strong links between subject schemes of work, there have been great opportunities for creating shared learning and teaching between subject areas.

In ICT students have developed their coding skills from Year 8 to Year 10. Our students have become experts in this field, receiving training from specialist and lecturer Ian Simons of Stranmillis College, Belfast. As a department, Shared Education has funded new resources for our students and has allowed them to progress in this niche area of study. As well as Year 9 students involved, Year 10 students have been given further opportunities to avail of Shared Education and maintain the strong and positive relationships established in previous years. We started with 163 students (all of Year 8) availing of expert training in coding in the first year. In Action Plan 3, 120 students are given opportunity for further shared learning experiences in both Year 9 and Year 10. This selection of students was based on those expressing an interest in coding in ICT and to allow for a smooth transition into KS4 ICT. Value added can be seen with one student attending Queen's summer school for coding.

In Science, students have progressed in their data collection skills by engaging in ecology fieldwork.

Gathering data, students were able to develop their numeracy and ICT skills by recording and presenting data in various formats. Departments have benefited hugely from new data collection instruments and resources, enabling HODs to bring Science to life. Year 9 continues to be the focus group, and moving forward further opportunities will be sought to increase student numbers in this area. Currently 60 students avail of shared learning experiences in the area of Science.

Student Councils have been working side by side throughout the three Action Plans. With their key focus being 'contributing to the life of the local community', the students have provided invaluable services to members beyond our school walls and within. Their work is set to continue with students fundraising to help the homeless and raising awareness for this cause among students. Currently 30 students avail of shared learning experiences through Student Councils.

Shared learning experiences have been provided for Physical Education students. Previously, 80 students have availed of shared learning. With relationships now firmly established in various departments, Action Plan 3 sees the introduction of the Maths department. HODs have created a scheme of work. Shared Education is helping to deliver raised educational and reconciliation outcomes in our partnership.



Student Councils have been working side by side throughout the three Action Plans. With their key focus being 'contributing to the life of the local community', the students have provided invaluable services to members beyond our school walls and within. Their work is set to continue with students fundraising to help the homeless and raising awareness for this cause among students. Currently 30 students avail of shared learning experiences through Student Councils. The student council raised five hundred pounds for the Simon community, this helped the pupils through community connections to understand the issues facing homeless people in Northern Ireland. The cheque was presented at a celebration event on the 4th June 2018.



Recently, as part of our Shared Education Programme, our student council took part in a Shared Education lesson/presentation hosted in De La Salle High School. The presentation was given by Cara-Friend which was established in 1974 as a voluntary counselling, befriending, information, health and social space organisation for LGB&T community. Since then they have been established as one of the most encompassing organisations in Northern Ireland, bringing together all ages, all genders and sexual orientations under one umbrella. They advocate unceasingly on behalf of the LGB&T community with the media, churches, government departments and politicians alike. An enjoyable morning was had by all students and staff members involved.

St Malachy's College & Belfast Royal Academy



Over the three years of the SESP St Malachy's College and Belfast Royal Academy have focused on the provision of LLW at Key Stage Three. 2017/18 saw the extension of the scheme into Year 10. It has been very popular with the pupils and the staff delivering it.

The bespoke set of lessons explores a range of themes and makes provision for progression in relation to both tasks and the topics addressed. Year 8 focuses on 'All about Me'. In Year 9 the spotlight is on 'Inclusion and Equality'. Year 10 challenges the young people to investigate 'Managing Risk'.

In order to provide the pupils with a meaningful record/memento of their experience a journal was created by each year group and professionally published.

Ebrington PS & Holy Child PS Derry/Londonderry
